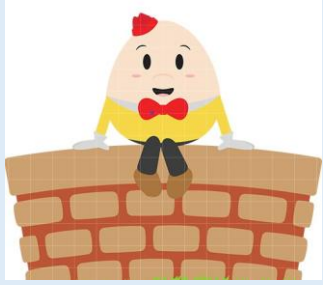

This term has been another busy and exciting one in Jack and Jill! As always, we've had so much fun learning through play.

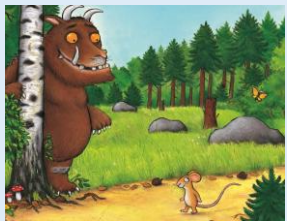
The children have enjoyed pretending to be mechanics, train drivers, and doctors, as well as spending time at our imaginary beach.



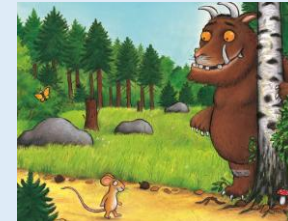

Gruffalo Class



At the start of the summer term, Gruffalo Class thoroughly enjoyed exploring our Community Week, where the children were excited to learn about the many people who help us in our local community. They were particularly fascinated by visits from our squirrel volunteer, the police, and a community nurse. The children also worked hard to create thoughtful thank-you cards to show their appreciation for the important roles these community members play.



During the second part of the term, our learning focused on homes in our community and around the world. The children explored different types of homes, discussing their similarities and differences, and compared homes from the past with those we live in today, developing their understanding of how homes have changed over time. As part of this topic, the children also explored the importance of families and learned about the many different family structures. Through a range of creative, discussion, and construction activities, they demonstrated their growing knowledge, curiosity and understanding of the world around them. It has been wonderful to see their confidence and enthusiasm continue to grow throughout the term.



The Very Hungry Caterpillar Class



This term, the children thoroughly enjoyed learning about different habitats, with a particular focus on the question, "What living creatures live in the garden?" They enthusiastically took part in a minibeast hunt outdoors and were excited to discover a variety of insects hiding in different places. Using magnifying glasses, they carefully observed the creatures and explored their features in greater detail.



We learned to identify and describe different minibeasts by counting their legs and closely examining features such as antennae, wings, colours and patterns. The children also developed their drawing and painting skills, creating some fantastic minibeast artwork inspired by their observations.

Our mathematical learning was linked to this topic too. The children used ladybirds to practise doubling the number of spots and finding the total, as well as investigating who could create the longest caterpillar on the light box using counters. They also enjoyed using a variety of construction materials to design and build their own imaginative creatures, demonstrating great creativity and problem-solving skills. It was wonderful to see the children's curiosity, enthusiasm, and growing knowledge throughout this topic and we are incredibly proud of everything they achieved during the term.



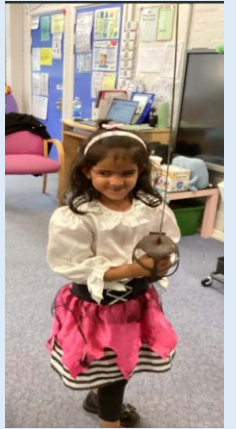


Snow Bears Class

From beginning Reception as early writers, they have grown into confident young authors who can independently write sentences using capital letters, finger spaces, and full stops. We could not be prouder of all they have achieved.

Percy the Park Keeper Class



Percy the Park Keeper Class has had a fantastic summer term, full of enthusiasm, curiosity, and a love of learning. In Literacy, the children thoroughly enjoyed exploring *Astro Girl* and *The Comet*, using these inspiring texts to write imaginative stories, create fact files, and develop their speaking and listening skills.



In PE, the children showed fantastic teamwork, resilience and determination, always encouraging one another and celebrating each other's achievements. It has been wonderful to watch their confidence, independence and enthusiasm continue to grow throughout the year. In Maths, the children grew in confidence as they learned about position and direction, mass and volume and telling the time through practical activities and problem-solving. Across the wider curriculum, they enjoyed learning about different animal groups and habitats, comparing jungles, cities, and the countryside, and discovering the inspiring work of Jane Goodall. They also demonstrated their creativity through drawing, painting and designing moving jungle animals.

As part of their topic, the children also learned about Queen Elizabeth II and her important role in British history. They demonstrated fantastic creativity by designing and making their own castles and creating beautiful stained glass windows inspired by those found in historic buildings.

Paddington Bear Class

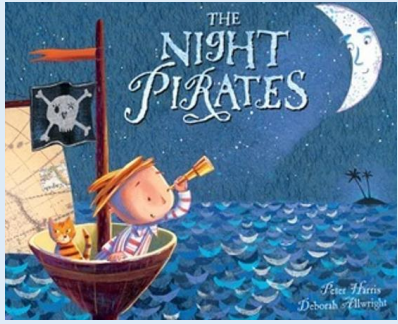

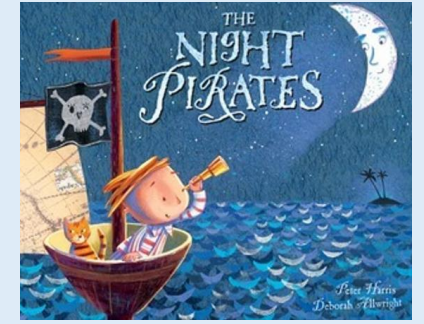

The Night Pirates have had a fantastic and busy Summer Term! In Maths, we have been learning all about measurement, using scales, measuring jugs and thermometers to measure mass, capacity and temperature accurately.



In Art, we have been developing our drawing skills by learning about perspective and the vanishing point, creating artwork that gives the illusion of depth and distance. In Science, we have been investigating materials and carrying out a range of exciting experiments to identify and compare their different properties. The children have shown great curiosity and have enjoyed making predictions and recording their findings.



Our Foundation Subject work has focused on bridges and rivers, where we have learned about the famous local engineer Isambard Kingdom Brunel and explored his remarkable creation, the Clifton Suspension Bridge. The children have enjoyed discovering how bridges are designed and built.



In Computing, we have been learning about programming algorithms, creating and following sequences of instructions and developing our problem-solving skills through coding activities. The Night Pirates have worked incredibly hard this term and should be very proud of all they have achieved!

Choir Competition

This term, our school choir took part in the Somerset and Dorset Schools Choir Competition and were highly commended for their fantastic performance and infectious enthusiasm. They performed Somewhere Only We Know in the style of Lily Allen, alongside an adapted version of Shotgun by George Ezra.

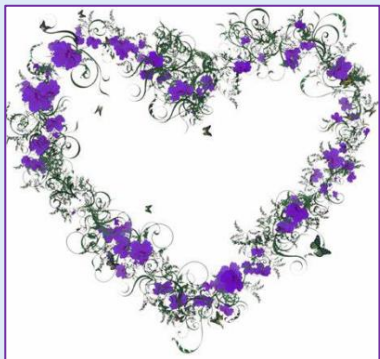
Year 2 Transition

Happy Retirement!



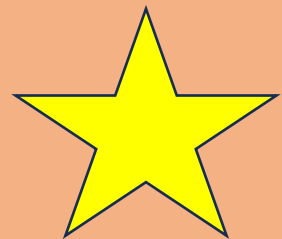

Keep Some Routine

Routine can help children feel safe and secure. Try to:

- Keep regular bedtimes and wake-up times
- Plan one or two simple activities each day
- Use a calendar or countdown to help children know what is coming next

Get Outside

Fresh air and nature are great for our mental health. Ideas include:

- Nature walks
- Picnics and outdoor meals
- Gardening or growing plants
- Water play
- Park visits
- Spotting butterflies, birds or bugs!

Talk and Listen

Make time to talk and listen each day. Try asking:

- What made you smile today?
- Was anything tricky today?
- What are you looking forward to tomorrow?

Sometimes children need a little extra time before they're ready to talk.

Make Time for Fun

Happy memories don't have to cost a lot. Try:

- Drawing, crafts or colouring
- Baking together
- Reading stories
- Building dens
- Board games
- Music and dancing

Balance Screen Time

Screens can be fun and educational, but children also need time away from them. Encourage a healthy balance by:

- Setting time limits where possible
- Encouraging active play
- Choosing creative activities
- Spending time together as a family

Look After Yourself Too

Children notice how we feel. Remember to:

- Take breaks when you can
- Ask for help if you need it
- Do something that makes you feel good
- Be kind to yourself - no family has a 'perfect' summer

It's OK Not to Feel Happy All the Time

All children experience all kinds of emotions. Changes in routine, worries about September or missing friends are normal.

Seek extra support if your child:

- seems withdrawn for several weeks
- has persistent worries or sadness
- struggles to enjoy activities they usually like
- shows significant changes in eating or sleeping

Small moments together make a big difference.

It's a great way to build confidence, encourage open discussions, and develop positive habits together. The Somerset Safeguarding Children Partnership (SSCP) provides vital resources, courses and guidance to help parents and carers protect children from harm, manage family conflict and access local community support.

Thank you for your continued support with your child's reading at home throughout the year. Sharing books together is one of the most valuable ways to support their learning, helping to build confidence, vocabulary, imagination, and a lifelong love of reading. As we head into the Summer Holidays, we encourage you to keep reading together as often as you can. Whether it's a bedtime story, a favourite picture book, a magazine, or a visit to the local library, every opportunity to read makes a real difference.

Did you know? By the time children reach the age of five, the number of words they have heard can vary dramatically depending on how often they are read to:

Never read to: approximately 4,662 words

Read to 1-2 times per week: approximately 63,570 words

Read to 3-5 times per week: approximately 169,520 words

Read to every day: approximately 296,660 words

These early reading experiences have a lasting impact on children's language development and future success.

Thank you for helping to make reading a regular and enjoyable part of your child's day. We wish you a happy, relaxing, and book-filled summer!
